EL Civics Objective #11.5: Cultural Background Reports

Introduction

Objectives for the Student:

- **1.** Write and/or report personal information: name, place of birth, native language, etc.
- 2. Identify student's country and continent of origin on a map.
- **3.** Identify classmates' countries and continents of origin on a map.
- 4. Interview classmates about cultural information (holiday, food, custom, tradition, etc.).
- 5. Give oral reports about classmate's culture and student's culture.

Tests:

TASK ONE: Identify and Describe a Classmate's Culture (10 points possible)

Students will use a map to locate and name their own country of origin and a classmate's country of origin. Each student will interview a classmate using level-appropriate questions about their culture. Each student will report up to 4 pieces of information about their classmate's culture/country.

TASK TWO: Present an Oral Report on a Student's Culture(18 - 24 points possible)

Each student will give a brief oral report about their own culture including general background information as well as some additional cultural information.



Cultural Information What does the word culture mean?

One way to learn about the people living in a country is to look at their customs and traditions. Many have been passed down for generations.

What is a custom? A custom is the usual way of behaving or acting.

For example:



What is a tradition? A tradition is a custom passed from one generation to another (grandparents to parents to children).

For example:

What is a holiday? A holiday is a day set aside to honor a person or remember an event. It usually involves rest from work. Holidays often include culture-wide activities and rituals.

For example:



July 4 – Independence Day in United States

Celebration of America's independence from England in 1776. Traditions include picnics and fireworks.

May 5 – Cinco de Mayo in Mexico

Celebration of the Mexican army's surprise victory during a battle with French soldiers in 1862. Cinco de Mayo means "Fifth of May" in Spanish.

Reading: Meal Times around the World



People from all around the world eat their main meal at different times. Mexicans eat theirs in the afternoon. They eat between 2:00 and 4:00 p.m. People in Spain have their main meal in the afternoon, too. Dinner in Spain is late. They usually eat theirs at 10:00 p.m.! Some visitors don't like that custom. In Thailand, dinner is the main meal. Thais usually eat their meal early in the evening.

In the United States, dinner is also the main meal. You might notice that families don't eat together all the time. For example, sometimes the father works late and misses dinner. In cases like this, he has his meal when he gets home. Sometimes the daughter has soccer practice in the evening. These evenings, her parents make her an early dinner. She often eats hers at 5:00 p.m., before the rest of the family.
